# Diversity & Inclusion Committee of the Faculty Senate Monday, 2/25/2019, Meeting Summary

The Diversity & Inclusion committee of the Faculty Senate convened on February 25, 2019.

Members present framed a Faculty Senate Resolution Endorsing the SGA Statement on the Comptroller's Report and Campus Free Speech (see below):

[WHEREAS, the Campus Free Speech Protection Act encourages the broadest possible latitude to students to "speak, write, listen, challenge, learn, and discuss any issue" and prohibits the university from denying "student activity fee funding to a student organization based on the viewpoint that the student organization advocates,"

WHEREAS, the Comptroller's report Special report: Sex Week at the University of Tennessee-Knoxville includes troubling suggestions that could have a chilling effect on campus free speech; and,

WHEREAS, the Student Government Association, seeking to represent the student body at large, has replied with insight and temperance to the Comptroller's report and to the administrative reply to it; and,

Whereas, high-achieving students exercising their first amend rights are point of pride for this University;

WHEREAS, the SGA holds that students should be the primary decision-makers when determining what programming will be funded by elective student fees; and,

WHEREAS, the SGA represents student views and needs to the administration; and,

WHEREAS, the support of student learning and of a vibrant campus climate for freedom of inquiry is of central concern to the faculty,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the UTK Faculty Senate applauds the SGA's statement on the Comptroller's Report and their efforts to become primary decision-makers when determining the distribution of funds for student programming.]

We also discussed final preparations for the Discussion Forum About Free Speech and Hate Speech to be held at 4 p.m. next Wednesday, March 6, in Student Union Room 272, and Roessner requested that committee members circulate the following text to community listservs (see below):

[Where is the line between free speech and hate speech? In the aftermath of hateful messages and threats scrawled on the Rock by white supremacists in 2018, we need to discuss and clarify the definitions of free and hate speech, the damaging effects of hate speech, and the ways in which our campus could respond. We hope the perspectives provided by our panel of UT faculty and staff, including Rob Blitt (College of Law), Michelle Christian (Department of Sociology), Jioni Lewis (Department of Psychology), Mike Martinez (School of Journalism & Electronic Media) and Frank Lancaster (UT Office of General Council) will begin this process. In conjunction with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual United at the Rock, this Discussion Forum About Free Speech and Hate Speech will held at 4 p.m. Wednesday, March 6, in Student Union Room 272.]

# **New Business**

University of Tennessee Research Organization – Stacey Patterson, Vice President of Research, Outreach and Economic Development

Dr. Stacey presented the information about the UT's Research Organization and UT Research Foundation (UTRF) which are two separate entities. At the system level, UT Research is responsible for UT research system-wide, the federal partnership with ORNL, and state representatives including the Board of Regents. She is responsible for all compliance and reporting for the UT system, working closely with ORE. The presentation is business confidential and for that reason the presentation will not be shared. Some of the discussion is shared below.

Statements (S), Questions (Q) and Answers (A) from the Council

Q: How much is ORNL involved in JIAM? A: Robert Nobles, Stacey Patterson and Michele Buchanan continuing look for collaborative opportunities, not just in JIAM, but other Joint Institutes.

S: IACMI is a \$259M program over 5 years. Dr. Patterson is working with all stakeholders on how to sustain after the 5 year funding ends. IACMI has been a big boost raising UT's reputation.

S: UTRF is the 2<sup>nd</sup> oldest research foundation in the country. It was originally created with UTIA's super strawberries.

S: Due to UT's non-profit status, UT is not able to own equity in a corporation and thus the foundation was born. The foundation helps to expedite leasing and contracts for real estate as well.

Q: How does UT compare with profit sharing with the PI? A: UT is more generous than most.

Q: What is the status of Cherokee Farms? A: Cherokee Farms may be fully occupied with a potential upcoming agreement.

Q: What is the barrier to Life Science Research? A: UT's medical school is in Memphis which limits much of the life science collaboration.
