The Faculty Senate Leadership Team has been hard at work planning the two retreats and lining up issues of concern to address this fall on behalf of the faculty.

We call attention to the CAS reorganization survey that we will be discussing Monday (see agenda).

First, three cheers for finally see the Bullying "procedure" on the books at UTK.

The UT Police Department is requesting a faculty member to serve on their Police Advisory Council, which is mainly focused on safety issues affecting UT. The first meeting is Monday, October 3 from 1:45pm – 2:30 pm. If anyone has an interest in serving on this Council, please let me know.

A reminder that we are in the first year of an Undergraduate / Graduate Council pilot program where we approve their minutes (and associated votes to place items in the catalog) directly at Faculty Senate and not first at Executive Council. This means we have one chance to review changes – we are the final step before things go to the catalog. Please read the Council minutes to prevent mishaps like the one we will discuss in Faculty Senate Monday.

A note that we will be working to "close the loop" on items where we voiced concerns or ideas and are not wanting to make sure those voices are acted on. For example, we are going to be asking about progress on the recommendations from the Non-Tenure Track Faculty Task Force (from 2021) today (see Information items for that report). We will also be working this semester and likely spring on how to enact the principles we identified at our shared governance retreat on August 29 (summary attached as a information item).
